
MOVING FORWARD

Student ACHIEVEMENT

Gaston County Schools provides a comprehensive educational program with opportunities for students at all grade levels. Our challenging curriculum includes courses in all academic subjects, the fine arts, JROTC and Career and Technical Education. Additionally, numerous extracurricular activities are available to students.

ACADEMIC GROWTH

Gaston County students are making academic progress on the READY state testing and accountability program. For the 2013-2014 year, Gaston County had 78 percent of schools (39 of 50 schools) to meet or exceed academic growth – an increase from 63 percent the previous year.



is the high school graduation rate – and it's our highest rate ever. Since the state first reported the high school graduation rate in 2006, Gaston's rate has increased 15.4 points.

DROPOUT RATE

Gaston County Schools' dropout rate remains low, which means more students are staying in school. Our dropout rate for 2013-2014 is 1.84, which is lower than the state rate of 2.28. Over the past eight years, Gaston's dropout rate has decreased significantly from 6.29 to 1.84.

SAT SCORES

Gaston County Schools' average score on the Scholastic Assessment Test (SAT) is 1423. Seven high schools saw an increase in their SAT score and Highland School of Technology ranks above the state and national averages.




GOING TO JUILLIARD


We also had a student named to the Shrine Bowl football team and a student who earned a state award for excellence in wrestling.

Our high schools also had many Scholar Athletes, a distinction that honors individual students for excelling in athletics and academics.



NATIONAL ATTENTION

Cherryville High School's Trent Friday earned significant recognition for superior performance in track and field. He won eight state high school championships, set state and national records, was named the Gatorade National Track and Field Athlete of the Year for 2014, and received a scholarship to attend Florida State University.

Cherryville High School's Rosalind White was named the Southwest Region School Social Worker of the Year.


OUR SHINING STARS



Many Gaston County school children look forward to eating in the cafeteria. That's why we strive to serve meals that are delicious and nutritious. Every day, 9,000 breakfast meals and 22,000 lunches are served, which equals more than I.6 million breakfasts and 3.9 million lunches served annually.

TRANSPORTING OUR CHILDREN

Gaston County Schools operates one of the safest school bus fleets in North Carolina. Our Transportation Department has earned national recognition for its commitment to excellence and school bus safety.

Every day, our buses travel busy highways, city streets and country roads, transporting our most precious resource to and from school. The district also provides activity buses that are used for field trips and athletic events.

All buses are inspected and serviced regularly, and drivers complete a training program through the N.C. Division of Motor Vehicles. That's why our school buses are among the safest vehicles on the road.

SAFETY: A TOP PRIORITY

Parents want their children to learn in an environment that is safe and secure. That's why we have invested in our comprehensive safe schools program.

In 2014, Gaston County Schools took numerous steps to further improve safety. The district installed new visitor check-in systems at all schools, updated surveillance camera equipment, fire alarms and Intercom systems, and piloted technology that provides more security at entrance doors.

Additionally, the school district works closely with local law enforcement agencies to ensure safe and orderly schools. Now, we have a police resource officer assigned to every school thanks to a state grant that makes it possible for us to place officers in elementary schools.

Efforts to enhance security are on-going because safety ranks as a top priority for Gaston County Schools.



ALL CONNECTED

In July, Gaston County Schools completed the installation of Wi-Fi at elementary schools. All schools now have wireless Internet access. With Wi-Fi available, the district implemented the Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) program.

Effective communication is key to our success. That's why we have focused on ways to enhance how we connect with our community.

NEW WEBSITE

In August, Gaston County Schools redesigned the district website and all school websites. The design is more modern and user-friendly and makes it possible to feature news, announcements, pictures and videos prominently.

MOBILE APP

To complement the new website, the school system launched a mobile app. The app makes it convenient to receive school information on a smartphone or mobile device.



COMMUNITY TALKS

The 'Community Talks with the Superintendent' meetings held in February and March gave Mr. Booker an opportunity to meet with and hear from students, parents, employees, civic leaders and other citizens about the future of our schools. More than I,200 people attended the meetings held at seven schools across the county and submitted I,600 comments and suggestions.

Our community expects us to be good stewards of funds for public school education. That's why we make every dollar count in Gaston County Schools.

What does it take to fund our schools?


Our 2014-2015 operating budget is \$231 million. Eighty percent of the budget pays salaries and benefits for more than 3,700 employees and 20 percent pays for services and materials/supplies.


What is spent each day to educate children?

For about \$40 a day per child, our students receive quality instruction, specialized services, transportation, nutritious meals, access to technology and much more.

What happens to money from the N.C. lottery?

Gaston County uses its \$2.1 million from the lottery to pay for school construction bonds.

The Gaston Early College High School won the 2014 Jostens National Yearbook of Excellence Award. Only 19 schools in North Carolina received the recognition.




OUTSTANDING BANDS

NEW SCHOOL OPTIONS

The Board of Education is moving forward with plans for new schools in Gaston County. The new school options are a first step toward addressing school facility needs and future growth.

FOCUS ON ACADEMICS

In today's competitive global society, it is imperative for students to gain the knowledge and skills necessary to be successful after graduation. We are committed to further strengthening our academic program and increasing student achievement.

TEACHER PAY

The Board of Education has identified more pay for teachers as the most significant funding priority for Gaston County Schools. While the budget remains tight, we are working on ways to improve the local supplement pay for teachers and other certified personnel.
