- Receive the following Good News for April 2018:
- 1. **Stuart W. Cramer High School** students **Emmily Mobley** and **Alex Klasing** qualified to participate in the Intel International Science and Engineering Fair (ISEF) in Pittsburgh. Their projects will be among 2,000 entries in the international event that involves students from more than 80 countries.
- 2. Madison Davis of South Point High School and Megan Farris of Ashbrook High School were chosen to receive the North Carolina Teaching Fellows Scholarship.
