- Receive the following Good News for December 2018:
- Cherryville High School and South Point High School won awards at the N.C. High School Athletic Association's invitational cheerleading championship. Cherryville earned first place in the Division II Small Junior Varsity and Small Varsity categories. South Point took second place in the Division II Medium Varsity category.
