- Gaston County Schools presented its most prestigious awards during the annual Evening of Excellence ceremony on May 2. Wells Fargo Bank sponsored the program. The winners were Teacher of the Year Mindee Mammano, Stuart W. Cramer High School; Principal of the Year Phyllis Whitworth, Belmont Central Elementary; Assistant Principal of the Year Donna Kelly, Rankin Elementary; and Central Office Administrator of the Year Valerie Yatko, director of business and community partnerships.
