

The Gaston County Board of Education will hold its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, November 13, 2018, 5:30 p.m., at the Gaston County Schools Central Office, 943 Osceola Street, Gastonia. At that time, the Board will . . .

- Recite the Pledge of Allegiance.
- Consider formal adoption of the Board Agenda as required by Robert's Rules of Order (revised edition).
- Recognize Students and Employees.
- Provide an opportunity for Public Expression. At each Board meeting, the public has an opportunity to address the Board.
- Consider approval of minutes of the October 15, 2018 meeting.
- Receive the following Good News for November 2018:
- 1. The **Gaston County Board of Education** received the Gold Bell Award from the North Carolina School Boards Association. The award is given to Boards of Education across the state that have all members to complete training through the Association's Academy of School Boardsmanship.
- 2. **Superintendent of Schools W. Jeffrey Booker** visited elementary and middle schools to speak with students in smallgroup advisory sessions. The students shared feedback about the school lunch menu, library, technology, and several other topics. Mr. Booker also met with the Student Advisory Council, which includes three student representatives from each high school. He shared information about the school district's strategic plan and conducted a discussion with the students about our vision, mission, and goals.
- 3. The following high school students were selected for the Broadway Experience sponsored by the N.C. Blumenthal Performing Arts Center: Marissa Cannon, Ashbrook; Emily Harris, Stuart W. Cramer; and Maddy Rostmeyer, Highland. The Broadway Experience is an all-expense paid weekend trip to New York City for 12 students from high schools in the Charlotte region. While in New York, the students attended Broadway shows, enjoyed backstage tours, and visited various tourist attractions.
- As part of GO Week for Education and Workforce Development, high school students from Gaston County Schools participated in campus tours at Gaston College and Belmont Abbey College. The students had the opportunity to learn more about college life, the application process, scholarships, and financial aid.
- 5. **Gaston County Schools** held its annual Marching Band Fanfare on November 3 at **Stuart W. Cramer High School**. The event featured performances by all high school marching bands.
- 6. **Highland School of Technology** ranked first and **Gaston Early College High School** ranked second in the Charlotte Business Journal's analysis of high schools in the Charlotte region. The rankings focused on how well schools prepare students for college and careers.
- 7. **Webb Street School** held a ribbon-cutting ceremony on November 7 to celebrate the opening and dedication of the school's new accessible playground.
- 8. **Lingerfeldt Elementary** celebrated International Walk to School Day with students and their parents coming together to walk to school. Joining them were Gastonia Mayor Walker Reid and representatives from the Gaston County Health Department and Lanxess.

- 9. The following middle schools won championships during the fall season: Golf **Cramerton**, Softball **W.C. Friday**, and Football **Southwest**.
- 10. Students from Cherryville Elementary, Cramerton Middle, East Gaston High, Forestview High, Rankin Elementary, Pinewood Elementary, Stanley Middle, and Tryon Elementary participated in the Mount Holly Lantern Parade. Students carried their own handmade lanterns alongside others, which were made to resemble the legendary flying horse Pegasus, a huge fish, a giant snake with working jaws, and colorful butterflies.

- 12. Classroom Central brought its "Vroom" truck to **Woodhill Elementary**, and more than 130 teachers from across the county had the opportunity to "shop" for classroom supplies. The donated supplies were valued at \$32,000.
- 13. The **Chapel Grove Elementary** bowling team took first place and received the Most Spirited Team award at the 2018 Junior Achievement Bowl-A-Thon.
- 14. The **Stuart W. Cramer High School** Stagestruck Players performed "A Cemetery Walk Through Time" at New Hope Presbyterian Church in Gastonia. Students gave tours through the cemetery and introduced tour participants to people from the past. The event served as a fundraiser for the school's theater arts program.
- 15. Cherryville High School junior Juliana Vollmer attended the Congress of Future Medical Leaders, a summer program in Boston for students who aspire to become physicians. Principal Kevin Doran nominated her for the program.
- A select group of Hunter Huss High School students participated in the 'Hamilton' Education Program at the Blumenthal Performing Arts Center in Charlotte. Student Donavan Moonie presented his original rap on stage as part of the program.
- 17. Hunter Huss High School teachers Michelle Ellis and Deborah Inman presented at the seventh annual Bridging the Gap Conference in Raleigh. In addition, school counselors Grant Sparks and Heather Griffin presented a session on building a trauma-informed staff at the North Carolina School Counselor Association's fall conference.

- 18. Hunter Huss High School chorus teacher Jackie Robinson organized a Male Vocal Workshop to give students in her classes an opportunity to hear from two male voice professors. Dr. Carl DuPont and Dr. Brian Arreola from the UNC-Charlotte School of Music led the workshop, which was intended to give the students (especially the boys) a chance to learn from male voice instructors about singing techniques.
- Students in the Hunter Huss High School Beta Club hosted the 19 annual "Haunted Huss" trick-or-treat event for the community. Students decorated classroom doors and handed out candy to children.
