Superintendent's Comments

Superintendent Booker thanked everyone who had a role in the successful Junior Achievement program last week at Sadler Elementary. Junior Achievement engages business and community leaders in sharing entrepreneurship and personal finance concepts with elementary school students.

As part of the Junior Achievement program, the school welcomed NFL players and others as celebrity guests, and the Paradigm 360 organization and the Professional Football Players Mothers Association honored former Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Edward Sadler. It was a very successful program, the hard work of all groups involved is appreciated.

Superintendent Booker reported last Wednesday afternoon we convened our first Business Advisory Council which is an extension of our Career and Technical Education Oversight Committee that was formed in 2015. The state now requires school districts to have a business-focused committee so schools can build relationships with business owners, community leaders and others. The ultimate goal is to better connect schools, teachers and students to the workforce.

Superintendent Booker reported tomorrow is "Students@Work" Day in Gaston County Schools with all eighth graders having the opportunity to tour a local business or organization. This gives students an opportunity to learn about jobs here in Gaston County.

Superintendent Booker reported another Career and Technical Education program that is connecting our students with the workforce is the Manufacturing Career Expo coming up on Thursday, March 29 from 9:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. at Gaston College. This event is a partnership with the college and the Gaston Chamber.

- It's a separate issue on the ballot
- Anyone who makes a purchase in Gaston County would contribute to paying for the school bonds
- Takes the burden away from property owners

Also on the Tuesday, May 8 ballot

A quarter-cent sales tax increase

- County will use revenue from the sales tax increase to pay off the bond debt
- Expected to generate \$6 million per year
- Equates to one penny for every \$4 spent







