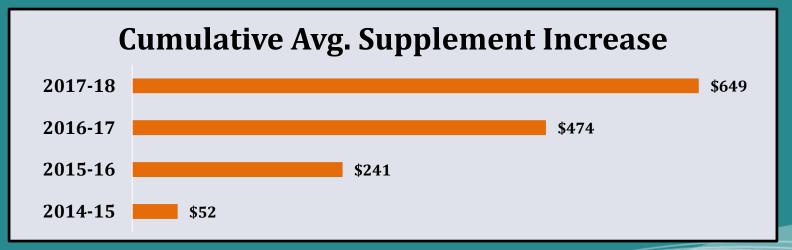
- The County has systematically increased teacher supplements over a five year period

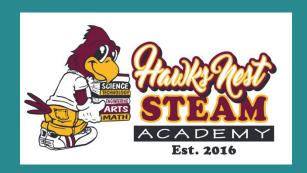

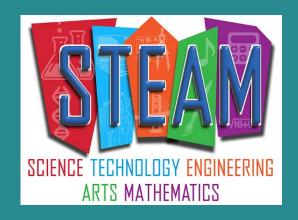

- Last year, we received \$48.4 million of operating funds from the County; an increase of \$600,000 from the previous year.
