#### Gaston County Schools Board of Education Monday, March 18, 2019 Meeting 5:30 p.m.

#### Minutes

The Gaston County Board of Education met in a regular session on Monday, March 18, 2019 in the Board Room, 943 Osceola Street, Gastonia, NC. Those Board members in attendance were: Chairman Brent Moore, Vice Chairman Kevin Collier, Dot Cherry, Justin Davis, Lee Dedmon, Dot Guthrie, Steve Hall, Jeff Ramsey, and Terry Usery.

Additional attendees include: Superintendent Dr. W. Jeffrey Booker, Attorney Sonya McGraw, Associate Superintendents Dr. Melissa Balknight, Gary Hoskins, Assistant Superintendent Cindee Matson, Chief Communications Officer Todd Hagans and Board Clerk Dana Luoto.

Chairman Moore called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. and welcomed everyone.

Superintendent Booker led the invocation.

#### **Good News - Information**

Superintendent Booker recognized Antwon McClee from Ashbrook High School. Antwon is Ashbrook's first state wrestling champion since 2012. Defeating his opponent in Class 3A's 285-pound final, Antwon went on to finish the season with an unblemished record of 44-0. Antwon was also named the Most Outstanding Wrestler in Class 3A. Antwon has signed a letter of Intent to play football at Mars Hill University.

Mr. Lee Dedmon presented Antwon a Certificate of Recognition.

Superintendent Booker recognized two students and brothers, Rex Dover and James Dover, who are the winners of our Gaston County Schools Spelling Bee. This year for our 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration, we held our own spelling bee and had an elementary school and a middle school winner. There were 38 students that competed in the bee at Stuart W. Cramer High School in January. Rex, a fourth grader at Belmont Central, won the elementary school portion after an amazing 14 rounds. James, who is a sixth grader at Belmont Middle School, won the middle school portion after a stunning 32 rounds. A few weeks ago the Dover brothers went on to compete in The Gaston Gazette Spelling Bee, where James earned a trip to Washington, D.C. to compete in the Scripps National Spelling Bee.

#### **Operations Committee Report – Information**

Chairman Moore recognized Mr. Steve Hall of the Operations Committee who provided a summary of topics considered and discussed at the most recent meeting:

•The one year walkthrough for Stanley Middle was completed on February 11 with a report of everything functioning as expected. For phase two, 80% of the storm drain has been completed and grading of the fields and site is in progress. Weather continues to delay progress.

•Belmont Middle School site is 95% cleared and graded. Approximately 20% of the footings have been dug and poured in Area B progressing towards Area A.

•Capital projects are currently listed on the Gaston County Schools website. Also, signs will be placed in front of the schools to show that bond dollars are being used at that site.

•Director Paul Williams updated us on our Transportation Department. He shared that our yellow school buses are traveling 2,160,000 miles per year which is 12,000 miles per day. We have 238 buses in the yellow fleet which includes regular route buses and spare buses. We also have 47 white activity buses.

•This is the time of year when Human Resources Department does the most recruiting. Last fall they had about 22 early contracts signed by student teachers to be employed for the 2019-2020 school year in some capacity. We are currently working with UNCC to offer a cohort for a School Administrators degree; it will be offered at Gaston College on the Dallas Campus.

•The Board of Education approves budget amendments and transfers each month. Assistant Finance Officer James Beckford discussed these budget transactions in detail with the Committee.

•Staff is currently using software called SunPac. In one to four years, they will have to change software systems. In 2016, the School Business Modernization Systems was passed by the General Assembly in an effort to modernize computer systems. As a result, the current AS400 mainframe will soon be replaced by EdCloud.

•Bids have been received to replace the roofs at Southwest Middle and South Point High. It will take approximately seven to eight months to complete the roofing project at Southwest and approximately nine months to one year to complete the roofing project at South Point. The Committee recommends approving the contracts for the two roofing projects.

•Three change orders were discussed to show changes for Stanley Middle, Belmont Middle and the floor at East Gaston.

The next committee meeting is scheduled for Monday, April 1, 2019 at 4:00 p.m.

Mrs. Dot Guthrie recognized Ms. Tequel Hager, President of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority representing the Social Action Committee.

#### **Curriculum & Instruction Committee Report - Information**

•Staff shared information on the NC Reform Model Annual Report submitted on March 1, 2019.

•First, second and third grade students who attended the summer 2018 Reading Camp maintained or increased their reading levels when tested at the beginning of the 2018-2019 school year.

•Students in grades K-12 must meet local Board of Education requirements in order to be promoted to the next grade. Policy updates for Local Standards will be presented to the full Board.

•The Office of Student Assignment registered 1,324 students for kindergarten during the registration kick-off week. The Online Enrollment Platform has received positive feedback from families.

•All K-5 teachers will have professional development at a Math-ELA summer institute for one week in July. The following week, rising fourth and fifth grade students from Sherwood and Woodhill will receive additional instructional support from the teachers. •Principals and staff members at our schools with a new Choice Program are embracing every professional development opportunity.

Superintendent Booker reported that registration for kindergarten continues, and we want to remind parents that they can register online on the Gaston County Schools website, or they can register in person at our Student Assignment Office at Forest Heights.

Superintendent Booker reported that this is Theater in Our Schools Month, and over the next several weeks, there are five opportunities for you to experience Broadway shows right here in Gaston County. Ashbrook, Stuart W. Cramer, Forestview, Highland and North Gaston are staging spring musicals for the whole family to enjoy. Our high school theater programs are among the best, and our students do an outstanding job. This coming weekend, Ashbrook is presenting "Hairspray," and Highland is presenting "The Wizard of Oz." Next weekend, Forestview is presenting "Oklahoma!" and Stuart W. Cramer is presenting "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown." Then, the first weekend in April, North Gaston is presenting "The Little Mermaid, Junior."

Superintendent Booker reported the date for our "Big 50 Anniversary" Employee Talent Show is April 9 and everyone is invited. The show is at 6:00 p.m. at Stuart W. Cramer High School. We have eight excellent employee acts and encore performances by our "Big 50 Anniversary" Ensemble that stole the show during the Back-To-School Convocation in August. Admission is free, but we will have "GC the Book Bug" there to collect donations to help purchase books for classroom libraries.

Superintendent Booker reported we will host the Kia Outstanding Educator Awards ceremony on Wednesday, April 17 and one deserving employee will win a brand new car from Kia of Gastonia. The ceremony is at 4:00 p.m. at Stuart W. Cramer, and each school and the central office will have a representative in the random drawing to win the car. This

is our sixth year for the Kia Outstanding Educator Awards, and we want to thank Mr. Chris Hafer and his staff at Kia of Gastonia for their continued support of this important employee recognition program. We will be promoting the Kia awards ceremony over the next several weeks, so be looking for information on our website, on social media and on Channel 21. And again, we express our appreciation to everyone at Kia of Gastonia for making this program possible.

Superintendent Booker reported Springfield Elementary and Kiser Elementary are hosting Community Open House programs on Sunday, March 24 with the Springfield open house from 2:00 until 4:00 p.m. and the Kiser open house from 3:00 until 5:00 p.m. Students, parents, teachers, former students, former employees and others will have an opportunity to tour the schools, visit the classrooms, meet the principals and teachers, learn about the schools' excellent academic and extracurricular programs and reminisce with plenty of "When I went to school here...." stories.

Superintendent Booker reminded everyone of the groundbreaking ceremony on Monday, March 25 for the new Belmont Middle School. The ceremony is at 4:00 p.m., and if you are planning to attend, you should park at South Point High School and use the shuttle to the construction site beginning at 3:30 p.m. And, if it rains, the ceremony will be held in the South Point auditorium.














#### **Promotion Requirements**

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#### **K-5 Promotion Guidelines**

- By or before the end of the second grading period, students who are falling behind should be identified for possible retention and referred to the MTSS Team. Parents will be notified in writing at the time of the referral of the possibility of retention.
- Grade placement is the responsibility of the principal. Local decisions in grades K-5 shall be made by the principal with input from the MTSS Team, the student's teachers and parent/legal guardian.





- We are requesting eight additional student support positions totaling \$520,000 to improve our level of student support in our schools



- We are requesting \$75,000 to update all Central Office locations with new switches, access points and cabling.


