# **Good News - Information**

This is an opportunity to add more rigor to the gifted ELA curriculum through the use of challenging texts designed to promote increased higher-order critical thinking.

In our middle school AIG classrooms, it is important for teachers to invest in critical-thinking process instruction. Consequently, we may extend the cognitive abilities of advanced learners in all talent areas and promote the types of thinking that college and career-ready young people need for success and satisfaction in their chosen paths. This is where the Shared Inquiry method comes into focus which will blend perfectly with the balanced literacy framework. Junior Great Books provide materials that use this blend of instruction. This makes it a unique product in the field of literacy with a proven success record. The Great Books Foundation is the only vendor that sells these materials.
