The Gaston County Board of Education met in a special meeting for the purpose of discussing the latest guidance for K-5 Plan A Implementation in the Board Room, 943 Osceola Street, Gastonia, NC. The Board of Education meeting was held virtually and conducted in accordance with social distancing requirements related to the coronavirus pandemic. The meeting was live on Spectrum Cable Channel 21 and the Gaston County Board of Education YouTube page. Those Board Members in attendance were: Chairman Jeff K. Ramsey, Vice Chairman Dot Cherry, Kevin Collier, Justin Davis, Lee Dedmon, Dot Guthrie (virtual), Steve Hall, Robbie Lovelace and Brent Moore.






COUNTY COMPARISON

Rate Per Capita





GASTON COUNTY COVID-19 CASES BY DATE REPORTED





PERCENT OF POSITIVE TESTS, BASED ON COLLECTION DATE





GASTON COUNTY COVID-19 HOSPITALIZATIONS



CASES, HOSPITALIZATIONS AND DEATHS




NC Counties by Tier: Data from January 17 through January 30, 2021




Gaston County School Age Data (Public, Private, and Charter)

ALL CASES AND CONTACTS, FACULTY STAFF AND STUDENTS





Percent Positive – Ages 4 - 11







Options for students

We made two options available for students/families:

- Hybrid Learning (Plan B) 73.5% percent of students
 A blend of in-person instruction at school and remote learning at home
- Virtual Learning (Plan C) 26.5% of students

 All virtual at home through the Gaston County Virtual Academy

One of only two of the largest districts in the state to open under Plan B

Social distance on BUS


2 Students per seat

It is recommended that all schools in Plan A and Plan B and Local Education Agencies:

- Identify at least one adult to accompany the driver to assist with screening and/or supervision of students during screening of on-boarding passengers, and to monitor children during transport.
 Allow for 6 feet of social distancing between students, and between students and the driver, while seated on vehicles if feasible (e.g., by tulizing larger vehicles with more seats, by increasing frequency of routes to reduce occupancy, one rider per seat in every other row).

Plan A: Transportation

Buses will be disinfected after each load. Cleaning products provided.

SEATING, DISINFECTING, and CLEANING

Drivers are allotted time, after each load, to wipe down touch points and use an electrostatic sprayer.

Additionally, as of October 5°, 2020, schools may choose to operate in Plan A for all kindergarten – 5th grade students. However, if schools operate under Plan A, they are <u>strongly encouraged</u> to operate school transportation under Plan B health and safety requirements. Given that school transportation vehicles are more confined spaces than classrooms, and that at maximum capacity a school bus could hold up to 70 children, Plan B ensures density reduction on school transportation to allow for additional social distancing in those settings to reduce the potential risk of viral exposure.

LAST UPDATED October 12, 2020

All Plan B schools utilizing transportation are required to adhere to Plan B requirements for transportation:

No more than one passenger may be seated per school bus bench seat with the exception that members of the same household may share a seat.

No more than two students may be seated in a non-bus vehicle unless all students in the vehicle are members

- of the same household.

Looking ahead

To transition from K-5 operating in Plan B to operating in Plan A:

- Facilities would continue to be closed to the public.
- Deep cleaning of facilities on Wednesday is beneficial.
- Gaston Virtual Academy (GVA) families would maintain their commitment of enrollment for the second semester.

Looking ahead

To transition from K-5 operating in Plan B to operating in Plan A:

- We, under current state directives, are allowed to operate in Plan A for K-5 and Plan B for grades 6 – 12.
- We have been operating in Plan B since school started on August 17 for all students.
- Schools and community would benefit from a 2-week transition to allow for schedule adjustments, operational shifts, and communication with families.
