Operations Committee Report

The Operations Committee met on Monday, August 1, 2022 at 4:00 pm. Our committee consists of Chairman, Lee Dedmon, Kevin Collier, Dot Cherry, and Brent Moore.

Our agenda and discussions included the following:

- 1. LS3P, our architectural firm for Grier Middle School, gave us an update on the current progress for construction.
- 2. Executive Director of Auxiliary Services, Morgen Houchard, provided an update on our summer projects, which will be presented to the board this evening.
- 3. Angela Calamia, Our Director of School Nutrition, informed and updated us on the Titan-Oracle Integration which is our new school nutrition software that will be implemented this school year.
- 4. Kecia Coln, our new Executive Director of Human Resources, shared with us that the Human Resource team has been actively recruiting at colleges both in person and virtually. They are currently registering for upcoming job fairs for the 2022-2023 school year. The department is working diligently to process applications and get them through Oracle for school leadership.
- 5. Associate Superintendent, Gary Hoskins, provided details about the bi-annual salary increases approved by the General Assembly and the Governor. He explained that the initial 2.5% raise was increased to 4% by the state. Classified employees will receive the greater of \$15 per hour or the 4%. Teachers and instructional support will receive 4.8% to 7.2% total increase based on employee steps.
- 6. We received an update on the School Business Modernization project, which the Finance Department and Human Resources Department continues to work on with and for all employees.
- 7. The Committee reviewed and is recommending approval on the consent agenda the following contracts:

The meeting was called to order at 12:00 pm.

Shannon Hullett presented an update on the state-mandated LETRS (Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Science) training for teachers and administrators. The research-based training will impact students in grades K-12. Kickoff sessions began on July 18, 2022.

Jill Payne updated the committee on mental health services and school support for the 2022-2023 school year. Support agencies have agreed to work with all families regardless of insurance or ability to pay. The agencies will continue providing de-escalation strategies and professional development for staff and communication with families. Two of the district's mental health clinicians have been relocated to schools to support staff, students, and families.

Aaron Slutsky shared information about the Gaggle alerts pilot opportunity. Gaggle is a software program that manages student safety on school-provided technology.

Chris Bennett presented information on middle school math guidelines. Due to the multiple levels of middle school math, administrators are using End of Grade (EOG) math and iReady End of Year test data to place students. Proper placement will set the foundation for future success with high-stakes assessments and fulfilling graduation requirements.

Cristi Bostic presented an exam exemption proposal to improve student attendance. She will also gather more feedback from principals and make the suggested adjustments. This item will be on the Board of Education agenda as a procedure for information.

The committee approved meeting dates for the 2022-2023 school year. The next meeting will be on September 12, 2022, at noon.

The meeting adjourned at 1:25 pm.
