The Gaston County Board of Education met in a regular session on Monday, June 12, 2023 at 5:30 p.m. in the Board Room, 943 Osceola Street, Gastonia, NC. The meeting was live on Spectrum Cable Channel 21 and The Gaston County Board of Education YouTube page. Mr. Hagans highlighted some of the significant accomplishments of Superintendent Booker during his tenure at Gaston County Schools. Chairman Ramsey presented a crystal vase to Superintendent Booker. Board Members thanked Superintendent Booker for his leadership and commitment to Gaston County Schools.

A brief reception was held honoring Superintendent Booker.

Good News - Information

Mr. Todd Hagans recognized Ms. Lynn Whiteside, principal of New Hope Elementary School. Over the past 10 years, New Hope Elementary has successfully raised a total of \$69,496.35 in support of the American Heart Association! In the past three years alone, the school has surpassed \$47,000 in fundraising, which shows the growing support for the school-wide efforts to support the American Heart Association.

Mr. A.M. Stephens III presented a recognition plaque to Ms. Whiteside.

Mr. Todd Hagans recognized Ms. Aissatou Diouf of Ashbrook High School. Last week. Aissatou was among the distinguished service award winners, who were recognized by the Gaston County Jaycees during a dinner and ceremony. Superintendent's Comments

Superintendent Booker thanked the Board for the earlier recognition.

Superintendent Booker recognized and thanked Todd Hagans and the Communications Department for all the "behind the scenes" work you do with our events. Our events always run smoothly and efficiently and we thank you for everything you do.

Superintendent Booker reported we had the privilege of hosting 15 graduation ceremonies that featured more than 2,000 students proudly receiving their well-deserved diploma.

Superintendent Booker announced we have transitioned to our summer work schedule for both our schools and central office buildings. Monday through Thursday, we are open from 7:00 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. and closed on Fridays. The summer schedule will be in effect until Friday, July 28.

Superintendent Booker highlighted several summer programs already in progress:

The Commissioners School of Excellence is currently underway and will conclude Thursday, June 15, 2023 after two weeks of activities. Our Camp Gaston summer enrichment program began last week, and our summer nutrition program, which offers convenient access to meals at various school and community sites throughout the county, will continue until August 3, 2023. Information about the summer meals program is on our website.

Superintendent Booker reminded everyone that new student enrollment and kindergarten registration are ongoing throughout the summer. We encourage parents to register online to avoid the rush in August.

Chairman Ramsey thanked Superintendent Booker for his dedication, devotion and leadership to make Gaston County Schools the success that it is and we wish you continued success.

Chairman Ramsey reported we typically do not hold a Board Meeting in July but we may need to hold a meeting in July to continue discussion on the superintendent search.

Gaston County Schools Operations Committee Report – June 12, 2023

The Operations Committee met on Monday, June 5, 2023 at 8:30am. Our committee consists of Chairman Brent Moore, Lee Dedmon, Dot Cherry, and A. M. Stephens III.

Our agenda and discussions included the following:

- 1. Executive Director of Auxiliary Services, Morgen Houchard, updated us on numerous summer projects, our two state funded capital projects, and progress on Grier Middle School Construction.
- 2. Two architectural firms have been selected through the RFQ process and will begin design work on an eight-classroom addition at Belmont Central Elementary and on safety and façade improvements at North Gaston High School.
- 3. The Cherryville City Manager has requested that GCS allow Gaston County to build a gymnasium on GCS property adjacent to Cherryville Elementary School. However, no recommendations were made regarding this request as the City of Cherryville has apparently found a different location for this gym.
- 4. A developer has requested permanent access to our road at Learning Place. They have also asked the Board to consider selling .75 of an acre that we own that adjoins their property. The Committee has declined to recommend these requests.
- 5. A change order for \$300,000 has been issued to replace unsuitable soils with stone and geo-grid for the drainage project at North Gaston High School. The Committee recommends approval of this change order.
- 6. Gary Hoskins, Associate Superintendent for Finance and Operations and Chief Financial Officer, updated us on the School Business Systems Modernization. As of June 2nd all retirement accounts are up to date and employee benefit files have been submitted, but are waiting to be accepted. Comp time is currently the only global issue outstanding and we are working with Oracle and CherryRoad for a solution. Freshdesk, a ticketing system used by employees to document questions and concerns regarding payroll and HR and to streamline the communication regarding these issues began on May 1st. There are currently 318 unresolved payroll folder issues and 13 unresolved HR folder issues.
- 7. Kecia Coln, the Executive Director of Human Resources, informed us that there were currently 220 certified vacancies and 110 classified vacancies.

- 8. The Committee reviewed and is recommending approval of the following contracts on the consent agenda:
 - a. Ashbrook High School Boiler/Chiller Replacement
 - b. Kiser Elementary School Carpet Replacement
 - c. Cellular Telephone Contract
 - d. VoIP Contract
 - e. WAN Contract

Jill Payne provided information on Restorative Practices Professional Development. Restorative practice focuses on equipping educators for building and strengthening relationships and community. Educators will learn the fundamental theory and practices for engaging with students, staff, and parents in the school setting.



Out of County Tuition

Tuition rates are calculated based on the total local operating revenue divided by the 20 day student count for the first month. The in-state, out of county tuition for 2023-2024 is recommended to be \$1,779 which was calculated as follows:

Local Operating Revenue divided by Student Count (PMR 1) \$53,251,704 divided by 29,936

Local operating revenue includes both the County appropriation (\$52,501,704) and fines, forfeitures and interest (\$750,000)

Out of County Tuition

Tuition for **out of state students** includes the out of county tuition rate of \$1,779 **plus** the State per pupil expenditure (PPE) for 2021-2022. DPI has reported the 2021-2022 PPE to be \$7,166. Therefore the out of state tuition is recommended to be \$8,945.


Capital Outlay

- This year we received \$2.2 million in capital outlay, or about \$0.44 per square foot

Federal Budget

Interim Budget

- This is the last scheduled Board meeting prior to the start of the 2023-2024 fiscal year
- The State has not yet approved the 2023-2024 State budget
- Therefore a GCS Budget Resolution will not be approved prior to the start of the 2023-2024 fiscal year (July 1, 2023)

Interim Budget

- State law (G.S. 115C-434) requires that the Board of Education make interim appropriations to pay salaries and other usual expenses for the interval of time between the start of the fiscal year and the approval of a budget resolution
- Recommend approval of a 2023-2024 interim budget at the level of 80% of the 2022-2023 Budget



Historical COVID Retention Bonuses:

Over the past two school years, qualified full-time employees have had the opportunity to receive up to \$5,000 in COVID retention bonuses. This was paid due to the additional challenges, duties and responsibilities that educational employees have endured since the inception of the pandemic.

New Classroom Teacher Bonus:

Since returning to work after the pandemic, we have experienced a higher than normal level of vacancies. This has had a significant impact in our schools. Teacher vacancies in the classroom are often covered by substitutes, existing teachers or other school personnel.

New Classroom Teacher Bonus

Summary of New Classroom Teacher Bonus:

In an effort to attract additional qualified teachers to GCS, we are proposing the following recruitment and retention bonus that would be paid to new classroom teachers for the 2023-2024 school year.



New Classroom Teacher Eligibility:

Must meet **ALL** of the following criteria:

- Must be newly hired for the 2023-2024 school year (not employed by GCS during the 2022-2023 school year)
- Must be working by September 15, 2023
- Must be the teacher of record for GCS K-12 students
- Must be a full-time permanent employee

New Classroom Teacher Bonus

Projected Payment Dates:

- \$1,000 signing bonus paid on September 27, 2023
- An additional \$1,000 signing bonus paid on September 27, 2023, for K-12 EC teachers, secondary (6-12) math and secondary (6-12) science teachers
- \$1,000 retention bonus paid in December 2023

(Bonuses are not subject to State retirement, but are subject to income taxes)

Recommendation:

Approval of the new classroom teacher recruitment and retention bonus in the amount of \$2,000 for all new classroom teachers and \$3,000 for new K-12 EC teachers, 6-12 secondary math and 6-12 secondary science teachers.
